Regional Biologist Report Bob Eriksen, NWTF Regional Biologist June 1 through July 20, 2009

Meetings

- The regional biologist prepared the agenda and facilitated the annual meeting between the Pennsylvania Game Commission and the Pennsylvania State Chapter
- Participated in the Delaware CREP planning committee meeting in Milford Township, Bucks County
- Attended the July meeting of the Pennsylvania Game Commission in Harrisburg
- Assisted Edgefield staff with a Diamond Life dinner in Harrisburg along with other NWTF staff from Pennsylvania
- Met with a representative of Chesapeake Energy to visit well sites and discuss cooperative efforts with chapters in the Marcellus Shale play

Grants and Cooperative Agreements

- A draft of regional biologist duties and a new cooperative agreement was prepared for renewal of the long-standing support of the regional biologist position by the Pennsylvania Game Commission
- A new cooperative agreement with the New Hampshire Department of Fish and Game was finalized and signed paving the way for placing a biologist in that region
- Work continued on cooperative agreements with the Ohio Wildlife Division, the Natural Resource Conservation Service and the US Forest Service in Ohio and West Virginia
- Funds were transferred to NWTF in fulfillment of two grants from the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development. One grant was acquired by the Honey Hole Longbeards Chapter in Luzerne County and the other was provided by the Department to the Mon Valley and Peters Creek Trail Chapters in Allegheny County. The grants will fund habitat work and outreach events in 2009 and 2010.

NWTF Technical Committee Representatives' Report - PA Chapter NWTF Board of Directors Meeting, August 1, 2009

Harvest Management

Spring 2009 harvest report cards are still being tallied by our data management bureau and will be reported during the next reporting cycle.

With 3 years of data for the special turkey licenses I analyzed harvests by WMU and gobbler age class. Special spring harvests were well distributed across WMUs for all three years. Hunters did not target particular WMUs for harvesting a second spring turkey. Similar to the regular spring harvest, hunters generally tended to select adult age class gobblers over jakes, at a similar rate as the regular harvest. Work continued on model development and defining variables for creating a structured decision-making (SDM) system for wild turkey fall season recommendations. The regional wild turkey population model and hen harvest/survival rate study are key components for the SDM.

In cooperation with Bureau of Automated Technology we revised the data management of turkey harvest reports for Automated Licensing System and streamlined data analysis procedures.

Wild Turkey Spring Harvest Rates and Annual Survival Rates Study

We participated in conference call with the involved state biologists, PSU and B. Eriksen to discuss data analysis procedures and timelines for analyses and final report.

Because the hen harvest rate and annual survival rate study is a top priority of the agency and start-up costs of the study are too high for us to bear even with PANWTF funding, the proposal is being submitted for federal funding through Pittman-Robertson funding and we are quite hopeful the proposal will be approved. The PCFWRC at Penn State (Dr. Duane Diefenbach) again will cooperate in the study, maintaining the data base and data analyses. Currently no other state agency is able to participate.

Annual Cooperative PGC/NWTF/PANWTF Meeting

Minutes of this annual meeting, held June 8, 2009 at the PGC headquarters were distributed to the PANWTF Board. This meeting emphasizes the partnership between the PGC and NWTF/PANWTF and demonstrates the health and importance of this partnership. The PGC Executive Office and all pertinent PGC Bureaus participate. Fifteen topics were discussed and 14 action items were identified for completion during the year.

Turkey Summer Sighting Survey

All Wildlife Conservation Officers (WCOs) currently are conducting this annual survey where they record the number of turkeys seen and miles driven in their state vehicle on a daily basis during June, July and August. Survey results provide an index to the turkey population by Wildlife Management Unit, and will be reported at the October Board meeting.

Michaux State Forest Turkey Summer Sighting Surveys

These 6 weekly 30-mile surveys also are conducted June, July and August. The June surveys yielded the second highest number of turkeys seen per mile driven during June for the 12 years the surveys have been conducted (2007 was higher). However, there were a large percent of hens seen without poults. July surveys are yielding sightings of broods, indicating that successful re-nesting is occurring.

Wild Turkey Management – J. Panaro:

Wild Turkey Management Committee Report June 7, 2009 PA Chapter NWTF Board Meeting

Wild Turkey Management changes requiring PGC Staff and Commissioner overview.

- 1) Support revised PGC Management Plan For Wild Turkeys In Pennsylvania, 2006-2015, operational with 47 strategies documented, measuring strategies as outlined, and the plan fully funded for 10 years; see Mary Jo's laetsst summary report dated 7/24/09.
- 2) Northeast Wild Turkey Population Model implement in wild turkey management plan PA NWTF has \$15,000 invested in development; model data and modeling results are requirements for future wild turkey management decisions; no current update on data or model implementation.
- 3) Recommendation to extend last day of spring gobbler season to May 31, permanently --- Commissioner's approved Memorial Day, Monday, May 25, 2009 as last day of 2009 spring gobbler season; Recommend Commissioner's approve Memorial Day, Monday, May 31, 2010, and keep May 31 as last day for future spring gobbler seasons. Commissioner's voted okay to end 2010 spring gobbler season on May, 31, 2010. Other than PANWTF no Commissioner public comment was made to make mandatory regulation for spring gobbler season on May 31 permanently. PANWTF discussed at June PGC meeting and we were asked to decide on May 31st clusre versus all day hunting. PANWTF is on record as requesting May 31 as the permanent closing day for spring gobbler season. (If May 31 would be a Sunday,

May 30 would be the closing day) All day hunting would have to wait a minimum of 3 years after that change.

- 4) Recommendation for Mentored Youth Hunting to including fall turkey hunting season in regulation starting in 2009; We need to support HB 281 to allow "tag sharing" with Mentored Youth Hunters and then work with PGC to get them to support including fall turkeys. Tag sharing would be a step but MY hunters are not currently allowed to hunt fall turkeys.
- 5) Recommendation to expanding youth spring gobbler season and regular spring gobbler season to all day hunting starting 2011, after 4 year gobbler leg band research project is completed in 2009 and project evaluation is completed by 2010; could be moved out to 2013 if all day spring gobbler season is adopted in 2010.
- 6) Recommendation to expand youth spring gobbler to more than one day.
- 7) Continue recommendations to reduce or increase WMU fall season lengths as management plan setting fall season guidelines are determined; using management data based on current field data and indices, harvest densities, population densities, and hunter densities, as charted measurements outlined in the wild turkey management plan; when management data supports regulation change; Commissioner Schleiden motion and commissioner vote got WMU 2F moved to 3 weeks under proposed rule making at January 2009 Commissioner meeting. During the April 2009 Commissioner meeting under final rule adoption Commissioner Schreffler motion and 5-2 vote got WMU 2F 2009 fall season to close after 2 weeks as recommended by PGC BWM and PANWTF. Board voted to reduce fall season in WMU 2D from 3 weeks to 2 weeks, and decrease WMU 5C and 5D from 6 days to 4 days as recommended and passed under proposed rule making, all other WMUs remained the same for 2009 fall hunting season.
- 8) State-wide gobbler leg band research first year 2006, second year 2007, third year 2008, and fourth year for study Winter 2009 are completed; all four years of research project funding support from NWTF and PANWTF is \$150,416 from NWTF Grant In Aid and PA Chapter NWTF Hunting Heritage Super Fund for research project equipment and trapping materials; PGC funded administrative, staff and transportation requirements, other agency project expenses; Reference Mary Jo's Tech Committee Report for 2009 WMU winter banding counts and update on Wild Turkey Spring Harvest Rates and Annual Survival Rates Study submitted for the June 2009 Board meeting; four year state-wide gobbler leg band study analysis, results, and recommendations will likely be available by December 2009 for distribution;
- 9) PGC submitted Fall Harvest Rates to NWTF Technical Committee requesting funding for state-wide hen research/telemetry study for 4 years 2010-2013. The request for NWTF Grant-in-Aid Research Project funding had mixed reviews. The technical committee thought the study was well-planned, but extremely expensive. This was primarily because the satellite transmitters are so pricey. The NWTF Tech Committee did not turn thumbs down on the project but suggested that modifications be made to the design or that additional funding be sought from other sources (the agency and PANWTF). If the initial year funding request (\$139,000) is reduced the project will be more likely to get support. The three other years will run between \$35 and 39K. This needs to be a major topic of discussion for Saturday meeting! Can we do it ... how do we pay for it??? See copied e-mial below ...
- Bob... between Jim Panaro, Bob Eriksen, and me we have been working all week on ideas to help fund the first year of the hen harvest rate study. We also have funding priorities and restrictions that need to be considered through our super fund budget for this first year commitment. Our proposal for payment commitment is: Year 1 \$20,000, Year 2 \$20,000, Year 3 \$8,000, Year 4 \$8,000, Year 5 \$8,000. Four year hen harvest rate study, five years for PANWTF payment. We believe that payment schedule is doable based on our financial budgets. Assuming NWTF Grant in Aid funding will be appx \$40,000 first year and 2nd, 3rd, 4th year payments as you have documented in the Grant in Aid proposal. What are those new GIA 2nd, 3rd, 4th year funding request? At this point the NWTF grant proposal to start in FY 09 is dead. We plan to resubmit this winter, and may request something like \$40,000 per year for the last 4 years of the study.

Before we take any proposal to the WTM Committee and Board of Directors for approval, can you please reply back with answers to these questions:

- 1) detailed description of hen harvest rate study, research objectives, and how the study will be coordinated and completed Refer to attached grant proposal
- 2) define what PANWTF will be purchasing in each of the 4 years of the study The total study cost for this 4-year study that spans 5 fiscal years exceeds \$3M. The generous PA NWTF contributions identified above (\$64,000) will go a long way in offsetting PGC expenditures to complete the project. I don't think PA NWTF will be purchasing anything per se, but if you want to think of it that way, trapping supplies might be good things to focus on. Trapping supplies alone will cost about \$86,000.

- 3) description of study WMU region size and where will the trapping take place Refer to attached grant proposal. We are focusing in 2 areas: WMUs 2C, 2E, 4A,4B and 4D where 3-week fall seasons seem to adversely affect turkey populations, and in WMUs 3A, 3B, 3C, 3D, 4C and 4E where 3-week seasons don't seem to be limiting population growth.
- 4) how many hens are proposed to be trapped in these regions to have an effective research study data base Refer to attached grant proposal. In each area 230 hens will be banded each year; 155 in winter and 55 in fall 30 on each area will be fitted with satellite transmitters.
- 5) any additional information that will help the PANWTF Board understand the importance of the research study Starting with the 1999 turkey management plan, the need to determine harvest rates and other important population parameters have been identified, to achieve a fundamental goal of maximizing recreational opportunities without jeopardizing the status of the wild turkey resource. Due to high cost of these studies, progress has been delayed. The 4-year gobbler survival and harvest rate study was partitioned from the overall need, and important information has been gained through this extremely successful project. We are now on the verge of moving ahead with studies to document fall hen harvest rates. Again, budget status of the PGC has slowed progress, but with the possibilities of the NWTF grant, state chapter NWTF contributions, and the possibility of funding this project through the Pittman-Robertson program, our chances of moving ahead are as great as they've ever been. Completing the hen harvest rate study in the 2 areas identified will help us populate the wild turkey population model with real data from Pennsylvania, and allow us to make informed harvest management decisions.

I believe that is all we will need to help answer Board questions factually and effectively and help the Board understand the details behind the importance of the research study. Thanks, Don...
