Overview:

Outreach is strong in Pennsylvania, however if we do not try new things, outreach will dwindle. Increasing memberships to outreach is very important. We are a membership based organization. Our members are our backbone of support.

With the new initiative of "Save the Habitat, Save the Hunt", Outreach is at the forefront in the initiative. The more individuals we can reach and maintain, the better our chances of creating new hunters for our future. Men, Women and Children of all walks of life need to be educated on our Conservation efforts. Hunters are the biggest group of conservationist. Funding for state wildlife agencies comes from hunters. It comes through our hunting licenses and tag purchases and through a self-imposed tax on the purchase of hunting-related items. Funds raised by the Pittman-Robertson Act can only by used by state wildlife agencies to purchase public land, improve essential habitat and create additional outdoor opportunities. These opportunities benefit anyone who enjoys the outdoors, not just hunters. We want to pass on our hunting heritage to the next generation; we put our money and efforts where our heart is.
